#### **HENRY N. BUTLER, JD, PHD**

Allison and Dorothy Rouse Dean; George Mason University Foundation Professor of Law; Executive Director, Law & Economics Center, George Mason University Antonin Scalia Law School

Henry N. Butler is the Allison and Dorothy Rouse Dean and GMU Foundation Professor of Law at Antonin Scalia Law School, were he serves as executive director of the Law & Economics Center. For over 30 years, he has led education programs that teach the basics of economics, finance, accounting, statistics, and scientific methods to federal and states judges, and thousands of legal professionals and scholars. From 2007 to 2010, Henry served as the first executive director of the Searle Center on Law, Regulation, and Economic Growth at Northwestern University School of Law. He has held prior appointments at the Brookings Institution, Chapman University, the University of Kansas, the University of Chicago, and Texas A&M University. From 1986 to 1993, he was a law professor at George Mason and, during that period, also served as an associate dean and director of the Law & Economics Center. He received a BA in economics from the University of Richmond, and an MA and PhD in economics from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University (where he studied under George Mason University's first Nobel Laureate James M. Buchanan), and a JD from the University of Miami School of Law (where he was a John M. Olin Fellow in Law & Economics).



#### **CAROLINE CECOT, JD, PHD**

Assistant Professor of Law, George Mason University Antonin Scalia Law School

Caroline Cecot is an Assistant Professor of Law at Antonin Scalia Law School at George Mason University. She teaches environmental and administrative law and has published articles in peer-reviewed journals and law reviews on cost-benefit analysis, regulatory reform, and environmental regulation. Professor Cecot holds a JD from Vanderbilt Law School, where she received the Robert F. Jackson and Archie B. Martin Memorial Prizes for her grades; was elected to Order of the Coif; and served as Senior Articles Editor for the Vanderbilt Law Review and Articles Editor for the Environmental Law and Policy Annual Review. Professor Cecot also holds a PhD in law and economics from Vanderbilt University. Following her graduate studies, Professor Cecot was the Postdoctoral Research Scholar in Law and Economics at Vanderbilt Law School and clerked for the Honorable Raymond J. Lohier, Jr., of the United States Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit. She was also a Legal Fellow at the Institute for Policy Integrity at New York University School of Law, where she authored amicus curiae briefs and submitted comments on environmental and regulatory issues. Professor Cecot graduated from Harvard College *magna cum laude* with an AB degree in economics.



#### JAMES C. COOPER, JD, PHD

Associate Professor of Law; Director, Program on Economics & Privacy, George Mason University Antonin Scalia Law Schooll

James C. Cooper is Associate Professor of Law and Director of the Program on Economics & Privacy at George Mason University Antonin Scalia Law School. Dr. Cooper brings over a decade of public and private sector experience to his research and teaching. He just completed a term as the Deputy Director for Economic Analysis in the Federal Trade Commission's (FTC) Bureau of Consumer Protection, and has previously served as Deputy and Acting Director of the FTC's Office of Policy Planning, Advisor to Federal Trade Commissioner William Kovacic, and an associate in the antitrust group of Crowell and Moring, LLP. His research on vertical restraints, price discrimination, behavioral economics and antitrust, and privacy policy have appeared in top journals and are widely cited. Dr. Cooper has a BA from the University of South Carolina, received a PhD in economics from Emory University, and a law degree (*magna cum laude*) from Antonin Scalia Law School, George Mason University, where he was a Levy Fellow and a member of the George Mason Law Review.



#### **D. BRUCE JOHNSEN, PHD, JD**

#### Professor of Law, George Mason University Antonin Scalia Law School

D. Bruce Johnsen is Professor of Law at George Mason University Antonin Scalia Law School, where he teaches legal and economic methods, financial theory, business associations, and the law of investment management. He came to George Mason in 1994 from the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania, where he taught courses in the legal studies and finance departments. Before that time, he was a visiting senior research scholar at the US Securities and Exchange Commission and an assistant professor in the Department of Management at Texas A&M University. His training in economics is from the University of Washington, where he earned a bachelor of arts (1977), MA (1981), and PhD (1987). He graduated from the JD program at Emory University in 1985.



#### **MURAT MUNGAN, JD, PHD**

Professor of Law, George Mason University Antonin Scalia Law School

Murat Mugan is a Professor of Law at George Mason University Antonin Scalia Law School. He is a prolific law and economics scholar and is widely recognized as one of the top young law and economics theorists in the country. His primary substantive field of research is the economics of law enforcement and criminal law. His recent work also analyzes issues pertaining to a wide array of legal subjects, including, antitrust, intellectual property, and contracts. Professor Mungan's research has been published in top law reviews and the most prestigious peerreviewed journals focusing on law and economics, including the Journal of Law and Economics, the Journal of Legal Studies, and the American Law and Economics Review. Professor Mungan serves as editor for the Supreme Court Economic Review and as associate editor for the International Review of Law and Economics. Professor Mungan joins the Scalia Law faculty from Florida State University, where he began his academic career as a visiting assistant professor and was subsequently promoted to serve as the D'Alemberte Professor of Law. Professor Mungan received a JD from George Mason University where he was a Robert A. Levy Fellow in Law & Liberty; an associate editor of the Journal of Law, Economics, and Policy; and won the Scott Whitney Writing Prize. Professor Mungan also holds a PhD and MA in economics from Boston College, and a Bachelor's degree in economics from Sabanci University.



#### JOHN YUN, PHD

Associate Professor of Law and Director of Economic Education, Global Antitrust Institute, George Mason University Antonin Scalia Law School

John M. Yun is an Associate Professor of Law and the Director of Economic Education at the Global Antitrust Institute (GAI). Prior to joining the GAI, he was the acting deputy assistant director in the Bureau of Economics, Antitrust Division, at the Federal Trade Commission (FTC). While at the FTC, he also served as the economic advisor to Commissioner Joshua D. Wright, as well as a staff economist. His experience includes the analysis of horizontal mergers, vertical restraints, and exclusionary conduct. Over an eighteen year career at the FTC, he has presided over a number of high-profile matters and investigations in various industries including consumer products, retail, intermediate goods, and technology. His research interests include law and economics, antitrust, regulatory policy, and industrial organization, and he has published in academic journals including the International Journal of Industrial Organization, Economic Inquiry, International Review of Law and Economics, and Review of Industrial Organization. He has also taught economics at Georgetown University, Emory University, and Georgia Tech. He received a BA in economics at the University of California, Los Angeles and a PhD in economics at Emory University.



#### TODD J. ZYWICKI, JD, PHD

George Mason University Foundation Professor of Law, George Mason University Antonin Scalia Law School

Todd Zywicki is a George Mason University Foundation Professor of Law at George Mason University School of Law, a senior scholar of the Mercatus Center at George Mason University, and a senior fellow at the F.A. Hayek Program for Advanced Study in Philosophy, Politics and Economics. From 2003-04, Professor Zywicki served as the Director of the Office of Policy Planning at the Federal Trade Commission. In 2009, Professor Zywicki was honored as the recipient of the Institute for Humane Studies 2009 Charles G. Koch Outstanding IHS Alum Award. Professor Zywicki is the author of more than 70 articles in leading law reviews and peer-reviewed economics journals. He served as the editor of the *Supreme Court Economic Review* from 2001-02. He has testified several times before Congress on issues of consumer bankruptcy law and consumer credit and is a frequent commentator on legal issues in the print and broadcast media, including *The Wall Street Journal*, *The New York Times*, *The Washington Post*, *Washington Times*, *Forbes*, *Nightline*, *CNN*, *CNBC*, *Bloomberg News*, *BBC*.
