Professor Amy B. Monahan is a professor at the University of Minnesota School of Law, where she has taught since 2009. She teaches and writes in the areas of federal taxation and employee benefits law. In 2013, she was awarded the American Law Institute's Young Scholars Medal in recognition of her work on both public pensions and health care reform, and its potential to influence improvements in the law. She held the law school's Julius E. Davis Chair in 2013-14, and was named the law school's Stanley V. Kinyon Tenured Teacher of the Year in 2010-11. She was elected to membership in the American Law Institute in 2014. Professor Monahan's scholarship focuses primarily on health and retirement plan regulation, and she has been actively involved in state and national efforts to improve the law in both areas. In 2010-11 she was appointed to the Institute of Medicine's Committee on the Determination of Essential Health Benefits, the independent committee charged with developing quidelines and principles for the Department of Health & Human Services to use in defining which medical treatments and services health insurance plans must cover as part of Affordable Care Act insurance reforms. and she has also advised various states regarding health care reform and implementation. Joe Nation is a professor of the practice of public policy at Stanford University. He directs the graduate student practicum in public policy and teaches policy courses on climate change, health care, and California state issues. His current research is focused on public finance and public employee pensions. He is also a principal at his own consulting firm, where his clients include RAND, PG&E, and others.

After attending a junior college for three semesters, he transferred to the University of Colorado (CU). earning a BA in economics, German and French and later, a masters in foreign service from Georgetown University. While at Georgetown, Professor Nation worked for both Madeleine Albright and Henry Kissinger. Nation subsequently received a PhD in public policy analysis at the Pardee RAND Graduate School; he then completed a post-doctoral fellowship at Stanford. During his tenure, Professor Nation authored 50 bills that were enacted into law. Professor Nation was the principal co-author of AB 32, California's Global Warming Solutions Act. Joshua Rauh is a professor of finance at the Stanford Graduate School of Business, a senior fellow at the Hoover Institution, and a research associate at the National Bureau of Economic Research (NBER). Professor Rauh studies corporate investment and financial structure, private equity and venture capital, and the financial structure of pension funds and their sponsors. He was awarded the 2006 Brattle Prize for his paper "Investment and Financing Constraints: Evidence from the Funding of Corporate Pension Plans," published in the *Journal of Finance*.

In 2011 he won the Smith Breeden Prize for his paper "Public Pension Promises: How Big Are They and What Are they Worth?" coauthored with Robert Novy-Marx. His other writings include "Earnings Manipulation, Pension Assumptions and Managerial Investment Decisions," coauthored with Daniel Bergstresser and Mihir Desai, which won the Barclays Global Investor Best Symposium Paper from the European Finance Association and appeared in the Quarterly Journal of Economics. Professor Rauh's research has appeared in the Wall Street Journal, the New York Times, the Financial Times, and The Economist.
